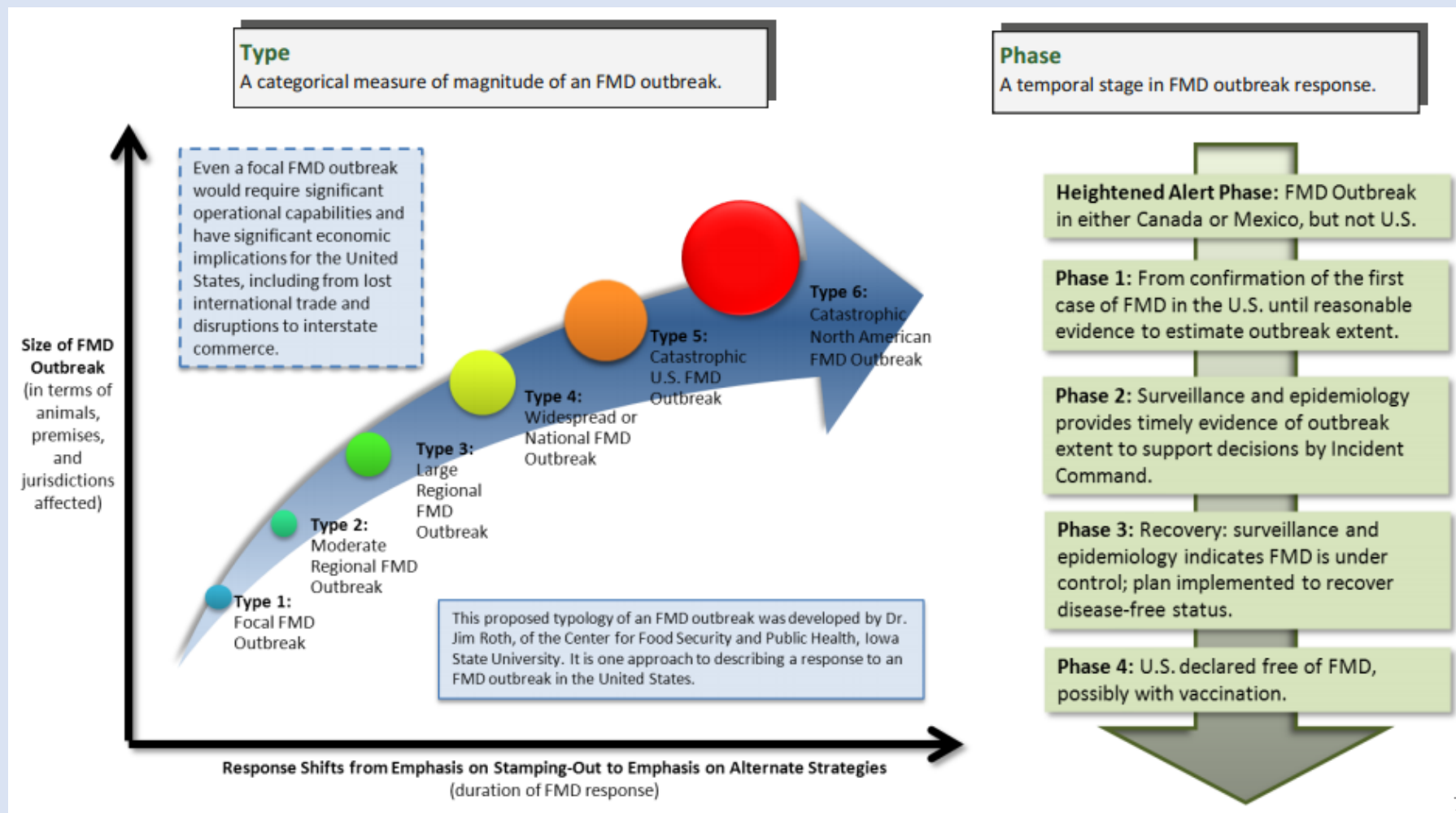
3 Goals of FAD Response

- **Detect, control, and contain the FAD as quickly as possible**
- **Eradicate the FAD using strategies that seek to protect public health and the environment, and to stabilize animal agriculture, the food supply, and the economy**
- **Provide science- and risk-based approaches and systems to facilitate continuity of business for non-infected animals and non-contaminated animal products**

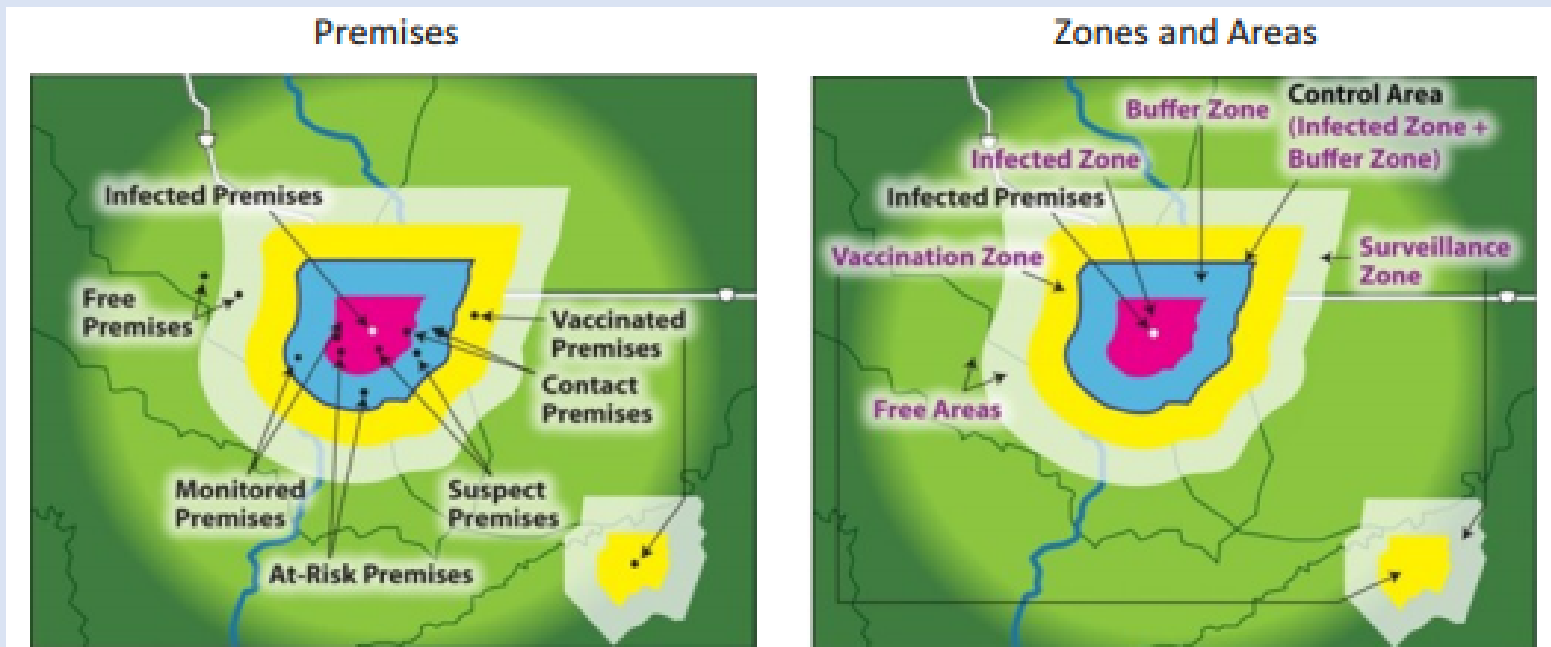
5 FAD Response Strategies

1. **Stamping-out**
2. **Stamping-out modified with emergency vaccination to kill**
3. **Stamping-out modified with emergency vaccination to slaughter**
4. **Stamping-out modified with emergency vaccination to live**
5. **Emergency vaccination to live without stamping-out**

Types and Phases of Outbreak and Response



FAD Control Areas, Zones, and Types of Premises



Note: Figures are not to scale. The Vaccination Zone can be either a Protection Vaccination Zone or Containment Vaccination Zone.

In an FAD outbreak, the Incident Commander will work with the Disease Surveillance Branch and the Situation Unit to determine the appropriate designations.
